

## Song Review: Marc Matthys - Illusion

**Overall Impression:** As the notes of "Illusion" unfurl in a cascade of mesmerizing sound, it becomes immediately apparent that the pianist behind this electrifying jazz piece is not merely a musician but a virtuoso, a sorcerer of keys weaving a spellbinding tale through the instrument - enter Marc Matthys. **Strongest Point(s):** The dexterity displayed is not just technical prowess; it is a storytelling device, each note a word carefully chosen to contribute to the unfolding narrative of the piece. Marc's control over dynamics is particularly noteworthy, and as a result, the composition can adopt a strongly defined sense of contour and shape that helps create a dynamic ebb and flow that keeps the audience on the edge of their seats throughout. The ivory keys become a playground for this maestro, and every note is a manifestation of technical brilliance and expressive storytelling. Marc navigates the intricate labyrinth of the composition with ease, effortlessly balancing lightning-fast runs with poignant moments of introspection. There's an undeniable fluidity to the performance, a river of sound that meanders through valleys of melancholy and peaks of exuberance.

One of the most captivating elements of "Illusion" is the symbiotic relationship between the piano, the double bass, and the percussion. The double bass serves as a sturdy anchor, its resonant tones providing a rich foundation for the pianist's flights of fancy. The bassist's nimble fingers navigate the strings with precision, adding a layer of depth to the composition. The interplay between these distinct elements serves as a glowing testament to the ensemble's chemistry, as they engage in a musical dialogue that enriches the overall tapestry of sound. As the composition progresses, Marc embarks on breathtaking improvisations, showcasing a mastery of jazz language and an intuitive sense of harmony. The virtuosic passages are not just displays of technical skill but are imbued with emotion, conveying a spectrum of feelings from exuberance to introspection.
